Upcoming Programs

- 1 Tuesday, September 13: Join Sand Lake Town Historian Bob Moore for an update on what has been going on in the Historian's office this past year and a preview of what's coming up. The main program will be devoted to the Chautauqua movement that began in western N.Y. in 1874. Chautauqua was an adult education movement that was highly popular in the late 19th and 20th centuries. Bob has been going to Chautauqua for 25 years and will discuss the life-changing programs the Institution still offers. A short film will be part of the program.
- 1 Tuesday, October 11: Local author and member Gloria Waldron Hukle will debut her 4th historical novel! Souls of the Soil takes place in New York's Rensselaer, Albany and Saratoga Counties. The novel spans centuries following the lives of two sets of American fathers and their sons—all four of whom share the same DNA. The story was inspired by an actual murder in New York in the year 1756 and driven by the discovery of a small family cemetery plot hundreds of years later. This is the fourth and final of Hukle's American Waldron Series novels.
- Saturday-Sunday, October 15-16 (rain dates 10/22-23): *Amazing Graves; Ghosts of Sand Lake*. (SLHS is proud to co-sponsor this event!) Details elsewhere in this issue!
- 1 Tuesday, November 1 (please note change from our usual 2nd Tuesday): Jack Casey will talk about Alexander Hamilton. Mr. Casey has published four novels about New York State, three historical and one political satire. He began a novel about Hamilton in 1982 and was so enamored with Hamilton's legal and political career that he put the novel aside to enroll in law school himself. Graduating with honors from both Yale University ('72) and Albany Law School ('87), Jack has practiced law in the Capital District for 28 years while also serving in governmental and political positions in both Rensselaer County and the New York State Capitol. As he sought to bring his Hamilton project out, the Broadway musical hit. Jack and his partner Victoria Wright attended Hamilton (An American Musical) the same day as Barack Obama; with renewed interest in Hamilton's life, Jack has edited his manuscript to embrace only the final two and a half years of Hamilton's life, focusing on the inexplicable tragedy of his death.

Sand Lake's Rich Agricultural Past and Present -- Part I

Let's take a look back at our agricultural history with a focus on the town's southwestern portion. This is the corner of the town near the Sand Lake Convenience Facility, affectionately known as "the dump" by those of us who frequent it. Here also are the hamlets of Best and Sliter's Corners. The

This portion of the 1854 map shows "Stevens Corners" instead of "South Sand Lake" but where we currently accept Sliter's Corners as being.

Best Sand Lake



1854 map calls this Stevens Corners, and was at one time known as South Sand Lake. The 1880 edition of *Sylvester's History of Rensselaer County* describes the hamlet as having, "a store, a hotel, a blacksmith shop, and a number of



dwelling houses." One of the most prosperous farms in the mid-1800s belonged to the Allendorph family (image from Sylvester's *History of Rensselaer County*).

In general, the western part of Sand Lake was best for farming. If we go back to the 1778 Van



Allen Survey Map, there are 14 farms listed in the West Sand Lake area, with the smallest being 140 acres and the largest being 325 acres belonging to the Uline family.

Subsistence farming, raising cattle and other farm animals was an important part of everyone's lives in the 1800s. One of the most interesting artifacts in the town historian's collection is a book entitled, *Marks of the Beasts in the Town of Sand Lake*, dated 1813. This book is filled with farmer's instructions on how they have marked their cattle, sheep and swine. In 1824, Pierce Horton, had chosen a "swallow tail crop in the right ear and a slit in the left."

The book A Resourceful People, A Pictorial History of Rensselaer County contains many old photos of area farms. It also considers the importance of haying, which many farmers depended on for cash. Hay had many uses, including bedding for horses in area cities as well as New York. Rye straw was used as insulation in ice houses. Many Rensselaer County farms were negatively affected by the coming of the horseless carriage.

A Rensselaer County gazetteer from 1871 lists occupations as, "teacher and farmer; blacksmith and farmer; sawmill and farmer; grocer and farmer; butcher and farmer."

In Part II, we'll get a chance to look at a Sand Lake citizen who could be called a "State Trooper and Farmer"! – *Bob Moore, Town Historian*



Recycling!

We all recycle, right? Cans, bottles, news print, cardboard, plastic? Perhaps even an old car or other scrap metal? Of course we do!;)

Of course, many other things can be recycled, not the least of which is a residential or commercial structure. In the Capital District in recent years, we've seen any number of old mills, storefronts, factories and banks successfully repurposed. And there are a fair number of these right on our own Town. Let's take a quick look at three of the most recent examples.

If you've been a resident of Sand Lake for any length of time, you've likely driven down Burden Lake Road and passed by the old Faith Mills buildings. One of those structures has been repurposed in a way quite different from its original purpose.



As noted elsewhere, <u>arts letters & numbers</u> (subject of our June 2016 program) is a new arts education organization here in town. In addition to a school to provide artist-inresidence opportunities and allow a wide variety of disciplines to cultivate a space that encourages collaborative and individual creation, they are preserving "The Mill," one of the former mill buildings, as well as "The House on the Hill" (on Burden Lake Road, formerly Burton's Golden Years Rest Home, a National Register designee).



Homeroom Lofts might not be a familiar name, but their location is truly a landmark near the hamlet of Sand Lake: the former Sand Lake School. Built in 1929, it was used for nearly eight decades by the Averill Park Central School District. After sitting vacant for a few years, it was sold off, with the new owners converting it into apartments while retaining much of the original character and detail of the structure. Outside it looks much as it always has; inside is very different, with clever design making the most of many familiar features.



Mess Hall ("A Military Style Cafeteria") is one of the newest restaurants in town, located in what might best be described as a "true survivor"! The little structure on Route 43 between Edgewood Drive and Sunset Road has been home to numerous restaurants, shops and even a bottle redemption center, and is now back to being a restaurant again. The theme and simple menu seem to be resonating with locals!

Amazing Graves: Ghosts of Sand Lake October 15-16, 2016

Introduction (by Bob Moore, Town Historian): One of my goals as historian is to help give the community a sense of place. Why did Sand Lake, West Sand Lake and Averill Park develop into what they are today? In reconnecting with our forebears we gain respect for what they have given us. With this understanding we can move proudly into our future.

Recently I've been working on a project, *Amazing Graves: Ghosts of Sand Lake*, that will give all of us a better sense of place. The project will take place in the Sand Lake Union Cemetery and will feature actors portraying Sand Lake residents from our town's past.

...a woman born in 1857...Six times I sailed past the rock of Gibraltar and through the Suez Canal, and I wrote five books about my adventures. – "Jessie"

These historic figures will include Dr. Smith Boughton (a.k.a. Big Thunder), James K. Averill, Sheriff William Griggs, Jesse Traver Moore, and others who made our community what it is today.

The project will also feature an exhibit that will be housed in the Sand Lake Center for the Arts. There will be old photos, artifacts and a calico Indian outfit, the type that would have been worn by Big Thunder himself.

A number of organizations have been involved in the production of *Amazing Graves*, including: Sand Lake Town Library, Averill Park Schools, Sand Lake Historical Society and the Sand Lake Center for the Arts.

Mark your calendars early so you don't miss it: Saturday and Sunday, October 15 and 16 (Rain dates are October 22 & 23, 2016.) There will be numerous shows from 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. both days, and a special "haunting performance" on Saturday night at 7:00 p.m. Admission is \$10.

Schedule of Events

- 1 There will be walking tours on Saturday, October 15 (rain date October 22), at 10:00 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 1:00 p.m., a seated "tour" at 2:30 p.m., and a "haunted" tour at 7:00 p.m.
- 1 On Sunday, October 16 (rain date October 23), there will be walking tours at 11:30

- a.m. and 1:00 p.m., and a seated tour at 2:30 p.m.
- 1 Tour members will be transported to the cemetery from either the Sand Lake Town Library or the Sand Lake Center for the Arts by school bus (except for the night tour, where participants will park on the lower cemetery road).
- An exhibit at Sand Lake Center for the Arts will include artifacts of the people showcased and of the era in general.

In the unlikely (we hope!!) even of rain on BOTH weekends, we are hoping to present the show in an inside venue. If the weather is iffy, people can call 732-2904 to see if the tours are happening.




