Cemetery Care Remembered

It's good to remember those things which will remove barriers when the time comes that cemetery use is necessary. Ross and I had attended a program on cemetery care in New York State several years ago so I reviewed the material we received. A statement, which caught my attention, was that 1,800 cemeteries are not for profit cemeteries under the jurisdiction of the Department of State, Division of Cemeteries and the remaining 4,000 are owned by religious, private or municipal organizations. Checking the internet for our town, Sand Lake Union and Elmwood Cemeteries are the only ones under the Department of State category.


Received of Frederich Paver. Sen Dollars (8/8) part payment on lot No. 92. Woodbrie Penetry, Sand Lake. Ellen a. Clark. Pres. Brodbrie Cemetry Ass. Received of Frederick Pane The Dollars, \$2) for digging grave of his child on Lot No. 92. Woodbine Cemetry, Sand Lake. Ellen a. Clark, Pors. Woodbrie Cemetry acco. Sand Lake Oct. 15: 1895. I called Audrey Trupia who is secretary - treasurer for the board of trustees of Sand Lake Union. She stated the most necessary thing for using the cemetery is having the deed to your lot(s). Responsibility for the lot(s) is to keep monuments in good repair, remove old floral pieces and trim any plantings as well as around the gravestones, markers and urns. Decorations which are placed on a monument make it easier for mowing the lot. The superintendent can be contacted for the price of providing fill for a grave which has sunk She noted that the cemetery is getting old as far as the age of the persons caring for the plots.

I checked to see what deeds we had for the Raver, Gundrum and French plots for which we are the heirs.

For Sand Lake Union we have the following deeds: Mae Raver for lot # 439; Walter Gundrum for east half of lot #530; George Leavenworth and Leslie W. French for lot # 392 ½. For Woodbine Cemetery we have the deed of Frederick Raver for the most southerly part of lot ninety-two.

Interestingly the Sand Lake Union lot #439 and the Woodbine lot #92 are side by side. Audrey stated there may be occasions when a burial can not take place if a deed to the cemetery plot is not available.

Town historian Judy Rowe gave us an oral history on the history of Sand Lake Union, which we taped. The private plot of the Averill family, the glass factory worker's section called "Eagles Nest," Woodbine Cemetery and remainder of the acreage, combined to become Sand Lake Union Cemetery, which was incorporated in 1847. There are veterans from all of the wars beginning with the Revolutionary War. Flags are put on each of the known graves each year for Memorial Day. Persons of historical note within the cemetery are: Revolutionary War veteran Thomas Frothingham, who was also a New York State senator and first superintendent of the Rensselaer Glass Factory; Deputy Sheriff Willard Griggs, who was killed in the line of duty trying to collect rent during the Ant-Rent War and Dr. Smith Boughton who led the



local Anti-Rent War protest. On the Averill plot is a marker to Moscow, James Averill's favorite horse given to him after the Civil War and buried at his feet.

Should a veteran's grave not have a monument

or the monument is beyond repair, one can be obtained from the Department of Veterans Affairs. A base for the monument needs to be provided.

When I spoke with Audrey, she also mentioned the lot owner's meeting was that evening, so I went. There were 5 burials and 3 cremans interments during 2008. There are no plots available for sale. If a plot owner has part of a lot which they want to sell back to the cemetery, this can be done if there is a deed available for the transfer. (This was evident from the transfer that occurred with the Suppes' deed being transferred to Walter Gundrum.) The entire cemetery is under perpetual care. Again it came up that some undertakers will not bury in a cemetery plot if no deed is available. And some homeowner's insurance policies may cover monument care. Solar lights and painted monuments are not allowed. Troopers make periodic rounds as a deterrent to vandalism.

On the Raver lot my Aunt May Raver Senechal's husband Walter, who was a Spanish American War veteran, has a veteran's monument which I remember being the brilliant white of monuments in the National cemeteries. Now it is black. Completing this article is spurring me to restore it. The next question is "How and with what?"

STONE TYPES

- Marble and Limestone
 - Water
 - Non-ionic Detergent (Photo-Flo from Kodak, Orvus Soap)
 - Household ammonia (Requires hose for rinsing and Hydrion Paper test strips for pH testing.)
 - Calcium Hypochlorite (HTH) for biological growth retardation (Requires hose for rinsing and Hydrion Paper test strips for pH testing.)
- Slate and Other Stone
 - Water
 - Non-ionic detergent (Photo-Flo from Kodak) (Ed. product available from Stuyvesant Photo)

CLEANING GENERAL

Good water supply

- Non-ionic Detergent Photo-Flo ¼ oz. /5 qts.
 Water
- 1 tbsp. / quart of water Orvus Soap
- Ammonia 1 cup / 1 gallon water (for marble only)
- Calcium hypochlorite 2 oz. dry /1 gal. Water
- Assortment of brushes (<u>NOT WIRE</u>) (varying stiffness)
- Toothbrushes (firm), sponges
- Scrapers plastic or wood

CLEANING NO-NO'S

- Wire brushes, metal instruments, abrasive pads (Scotchbrite, Brillo, Steel wool)
- Acid or acidic cleaners (<u>especially</u> on marble or limestone; should only be used by conservators with proper training on non-calcareous stone)
- Household cleaners: soap (Ivory), detergents (liquid or powder), Borax, Clorox, TSP, Calgon, Fantastik, Formula 409, Spic and Span (or any other abrasive cleaner)

Remember: The use of improper cleaning materials and practices can cause serious and irreparable damage to gravestones! Make sure the stone is stable before attempting to clean it – no flaking, delaminating, etc.


Other questions and concerns can best be addressed by contacting the following cemetery persons: Sand Lake Union - Robert Wagner president (674-3784) or Audrey Trupia, secretary – treasurer (674-3151) and James Flint superintendent (283-5303); Elmwood Cemetery - Sandra Billings, cemetery association president (283-4618), Peter Sprague assistant superintendent (674-2795). Elmwood Cemetery has recently acquired two acres of land for additional lots. As we mentioned other cemeteries would be under town, church or private property jurisdiction.

Someone is sure to ask how I make out with cleaning the veteran's monument. I promise that I will work on that project and will give a follow-up report in the next *Highlights.*—*Mary French*

West Sand Lake Firehouse Restorations

Ray Wheland undertook the Board of Commissioners' project to have the cupola of the bell tower on the old West Sand Lake Fire House restored. He is proud of the fine job which was done. When we went to photograph it for *Highlights*, he pointed out that the roof was restored with the curve in the roof line and grounding for lightning was installed. And the spire is back. Again it is points skyward and now has an eagle weather vane.

West Sand Lake Fire Company President Dennis Sinnott is pleased to announce the go-ahead for other restoration plans in the near future. From "years of fund raisers" they will install full glass doors in the front

Cupola from the old West Sand Lake Post Office

Another cupola came under Ray Wheland's watchful eye and care in restoration. With property being demolished for the Rite Aid Pharmacy at West Sand Lake Corners, Ray Wheland, whose yard is full of artifacts of yesteryear, became aware that a cupola, which was not easily seen when passing in the front of the old West Sand Lake Post Office, (most recently Fine



Art and Framing business) was close to being demolished. A reprieve was granted and Tom Cipperley helped Ray get the cupola down and over to his yard behind Hannaford's (formerly Miller's) Market. Ray

said there had been a ballroom on the upper story of that building and the cupola was over the back part of it. From the picture you can see the fine restoration job Ray has done, even to adding a lady who would be watching for the man in her life to return. That scene was a very prevalent one near the sea coast.

With the Rite Aid Pharmacy receiving the OK from the Town Planning Board it will be good to have a piece of one of the "old buildings" as a reminder of former days. Thanks, Ray!!

Log Church site, 1776

An historical marker now designates the site of the first church building in the town. It was a log building serving as pastor's home, schoolhouse and Lutheran



church located on the present Thomas I. Cipperley property. Several stones from the cemetery are preserved at Eastfield Village. The church was the forerunner of the Zion's Evangelical Lutheran Church, which opened in 1816.

Celebrate 400 years of history!

September 12, 2009, 8pm; \$18 Music Favorites of Hudson River School Artists, by the Musicians of Ma'alwyck

Sand Lake Center for the Arts will present the Musicians of Ma'alwyck, a classical ensemble with guitar, flute, violin, cello and two singers, who will present a program of the favorite music of Thomas Cole, considered the

founder of the Hudson River School of painting. He lived in the Catskills close to the Hudson River for the last decade of his life. An accomplished amateur flutist and guitarist, he enjoyed making music at his home with friends and colleagues. This program will draw upon music from his time and simulate an evening with Thomas Cole.

The program was specifically designed by the Musicians to commemorate Hudson River arts history and will be held in the Center's Fuess Performing Space. The Musicians will share information with the audience during the performance.

October 4, 2009, 2:30 pm; no cost Remembering Life in Albany and the Hudson River Area: Readings by William Kennedy

Noted Averill Park resident William Kennedy will share some of his background on the Hudson River area through readings from his works. Acclaimed author, screenwriter and playwright as well as a professor of creative writing at UAlbany, William Kennedy has been recognized with numerous literary awards including the Pulitzer Prize. Many of Kennedy's novels are set in Albany and make use of incidents from Albany's history. A reception will follow his presentation.

October 10, 2009, 8pm; \$16 Folk Songs and Lore of the Hudson River Valley by Rich Bala and the Barefoot Boys

Rich Bala and the Barefoot Boys will commemorate the history and folklore of the Hudson River when they appear in period clothing, presenting songs and stories celebrating life along the Hudson River. Take a journey back in time to the Hudson Valley of long ago with The Barefoot Boys as your musical "tour guides". With their extensive repertoire, exquisite 3-part harmonies, and enormous range of instruments (guitar, banjo, fiddle, mandolin, concertina, standup bass, and both mountain and hammered dulcimers), Rich, Tom and Rick will lead you along the rivers and canals and then up into the mountains of this historic and majestic region. Along the way, you'll hear about sloops and steamboats, visit with canalers and whaleboat crews, sing chanteys and songs from the lumber camp shantys, relive events from the Revolutionary Wars and the tenant farmers' war, and in the end come away with a fuller, deeper, and more meaningful appreciation of the significant and expansive role this region played in shaping the history, development, and legacy of this country. Rich and his groups have performed in many Hudson River Valley festivals and at historical sites.


