The Twenty-first Century's First Decade ~ 2000 - 2010

2000

- Very noteworthy is that *Historical Highlights* has had three issues published each year by Andy Mace.
- The Averill Park and Sand Lake Fire Company No.1 published their booklet on 100 years of service.
- Remembering Crooked Lake House was celebrated on site.
- Al Hayner shared over 40 years of *Sand Lake Advertiser* history (now *The Advertiser*).

2001

- 1 Mike St Germain, Scoutmaster for Troop #526, completed a review of 75 years of the Town's Boy Scout history.
- 1 Images of America SAND LAKE, coauthored by Mary D. French & Robert J. Lilly, was published.

2002

- Robert J. Lilly was honored for his work as editor of *Historical Highlights* and spearheading projects of libraries, schools, town supervisors and mills.
- Zion's United Church of Christ celebrated their 150th anniversary.

2003

- 1 Historical Highlights featured the bells of Sand Lake and centennial celebration of West Sand Lake Grange #949.
- 1 St Henry's celebrated its 100th anniversary.
- Heritage Day was held inviting persons to bring historic pictures, letters, deeds, Bible records for scanning. (Another Heritage Day was held in **2005.**)
- An Old Time Country Dance and Social was hosted at Ron Berti's and Barbara Neu's historic Knowlson House. We were invited there for our Christmas Program and have enjoyed their hospitality for our December meeting *each succeeding year*.

- Averill Park School District turned 75.

2010


- Sand Lake Kiwanis celebrated its 60th anniversary.

To begin with the year 2006. requests for information about H.H. Butler printed in The Advertiser, received responses from residents who kindly responded. Requests continue.


Who is responsible for Butler Park on Gettle Road

Radz and Michael St. Germain as well. Cousin Marilyn G. Malik reports having a Butler dairy milk bottle.


About 1945, the sign on the grey barn took shape in my mind, as I sat in the back seat of our Father's car riding home from Troy or West Sand Lake or Waterford to Averill Park or passed Bon Acre Farm aboard the United Traction

Conversation and reminiscence with Michael St. Germain at Taborton Fair 2006 was a childhood memory taken to adult interest. The carriage stored in a Butler barn! Curiosity expanding farming, business, horses and philanthropy are revealed in answers. Others will comment or add or suggest with reading of it.

Hyman Harry Butler resided in Averill Park, Troy and New York City. The summer home facing Crystal Lake yet stands. That location brings closeness to Gettle Road and Butler Park bearing his name. The park is a portion of the 150 acre farm known as Pinehurst. A deed for the farmhouse is dated 1857. Hay was stored in the aforementioned barn. Nearby Bon Acre Farm in 1934 - 1935 boarded a horse owned by Butler. A race track was part of the farm. Mr. Oliver told of fallen bleachers near

the track in the mid 1930s. The track location, estimated, was at the present sports field of the high school.

Don added the remembrance of sleeping in the tack room and working on the farm. Shetland ponies were boarded. Two barns existed with the farm house. He recalled two families of tenant farmers, and two employees, Doris and "Gimp," who were paid \$4-\$5

dollars a week. Corn was a crop. Dairy was part of his work. The milk house contained a trough of water where 40 quart cans of milk cooled. A busy day of farm work for a lad!

Earlier in 1920, William Leavenworth, grandfather of Clare L. Radz, lived and worked on the farm with his large family for a few months caring for horses. Horses worked the farm.

Raising and racing race horses, having been noted, it is worth reporting that one of Butler's horses, Exciter's Brother, came in first in New Lebanon, New York, July 4, 1931. Newspaper items also noted on two occasions the horse "Southern Belle owned by H.H. Butler of New York, in reserve."

Quite a different matter is the newspaper report in *New York Times* October 24, 1948. "An agriculture school for Jewish men and women who plan to live in Israel has been opened on a 150-acre farm near Averill Park. H.H. Butler of New York City said he had given the farm to the Palestine foundation Youth Movement, Inc. and that six of an expected fifty students already had arrived. The school, Mr. Butler added, is one of five being operated to prepare Jews for a new life in Israel."

Butler's in the Butler Building was a clothing store in Troy on River Street between Paul's Restaurant and the American Theater, featuring apparel for men, women, and children. Sid Gallant remembered his mother-in-law Harriet Bailey, worked there. Fifty-three retail stores coast-to-coast are reported owned by Butler.

Recent excitement spurred this writing. At St. Henry's Church, Jeanne Petropol and Liz Turner told of the daughter-in-law of Mr. Butler who lives in Manhattan. Marion Butler with her husband ran a private school in Manhattan. Her husband was Leon.

Glad for the opportunity to add to the "story" of that sign on the barn. – *Nancy W. Davis, October 2010*

His presentation received favorable action with the Historical Society donating \$500.00 for gravestone repairs. 
