At our May 14 Annual Meeting the Trustees will nominate Ross and Mary French for a vote by the members to become Honorary Lifetime Members of the Sand Lake Historical Society.

Here are the programs that have informed and entertained us during the past few months:

Holiday Pot Luck Dinner at Knowlson House, the home of Ron Berti and Barbara Neu-Berti, on December 11. Peg Harbour-Holland spoke on the topic "Introduction to Genealogy and Resources of the Capital District Genealogical Society." She is an active volunteer member of CDGS.

The program on January 8 was Jim Bonesteel, president of the Rensselaer Plateau Alliance. He spoke about the "History of the Rensselaer Plateau."

Michael A. Esposito spoke about "Troy's Little Italy," on February 12. Mr. Esposito, a life-long resident of Troy, is the author of Images *of America: Troy's Little Italy*. (Arcadia Publishing, 2009)

John "Mac" McEvilly, on March 12, presented "The Irish in the Civil War: North and South", told from the perspective of an Irish Civil War veteran soldier. Jack Smead and musicals @ AP

NOTE: This is just the beginning of what we hope soon will be an expanded feature on the Historical Society's web site, documenting a wonderful time in the 1960s in Averill Park: musicals at the high school during the school year and also, for a number of years in the latter part of the 1960s, during the summer. The man who made it all possible then: John C. "Jack" Smead!



Dee Erickson, Marietta Mitchell and Andrew Mace share memories of that time here. Ask the usher to show you to your seats, 'cause the show is about to start!



I can't remember exactly the year when Mr. Smead cast a spell over me and many in our community. My parents took me to see the APHS vocal music dept.'s production of "The King and I." I think it starred Mike Stahlman and Joyce Schmidt. "Anna" was dressed in beautiful gowns crafted by local women

who used vards of beautiful fabrics to make authentic gowns. There were dozens of girls and children costumed as the wives and children of the

King. Mr. Smead with Miss (Brenda) French from the art dept. and her students created beautiful scenery and backdrops. Linda Pawlson became a permanent set designer. I was completely stage struck. It was MAGIC!

When I was in 7th grade, my friend and classmate, Connie Cooke, was cast as a young Amahl in the Menotti opera "Amahl

and the Night Visitors." The cast included a gifted senior Helen Thayer and some of the Plante boys from Poestenkill. To this day it remains one of my favorite holiday pieces.



When I was in 8th grade, I had my big break. I was cast as one of many young slave dancers in "Showboat," starring siblings Helen and Bill Thayer. (FYI, dancing was not my forte.) That same year, my sister Mary Pierce (LaFleur) landed the role of Eliza Doolittle in "My Fair Lady." Audrey Hepburn was named the star of the movie version and her costumes and incredible hats were featured in LOOK magazine. Again, the local women under Jack's direction, created the same costumes and hats - an incredible feat. Some of these talented women were Mim Debus, Kitty Reid, Peg Sweger, Bea Danks, Kitty Mace, and my mother, Edna Pierce. Dick Fredericks and Mike Davis and the

At some point, Mr. Smead was putting on three major musicals a year! They included "Oklahoma" with Bob Campano and Elaine Malloy, "Carousel" with Bob Stackrow, Janice Stevens, Mike Bocketti and Joyce Craver, and "Finian's Rainbow." "South Pacific" and "Camelot" followed as did "Brigadoon."

late Jimmy McGuire also starred.

At some point (around 1965? —Ed.), Jack was paid a small salary to stage a summer theatre, originally called Lyric Theatre. Over a six-week period, SIX shows were staged, an amazing feat for any group, especially a bunch of high school students who all had summer daytime jobs.

The first season had several minor shows, the melodrama "Love Rides the Rails — or, Will the

Mail Train Run Tonight" and "Dinny and the Witches." Other shows over the first and second seasons included "The Telephone" and "The Medium" — both Gian Carlo Mennoti operas — and "Trouble in Tahiti," a one-act opera by Leonard




Bernstein. All three starred Mary Pierce; the third also starred the late Jeff House.

Another week featured "Down in the Valley" by Kurt Weill. I think Martha Whelden and John Miadzielec were two of the stars.

"The Unsinkable Molly Brown," "Once upon a Mattress," "Kiss me Kate" and again, the everpopular "Carousel," were featured. And who could forget "A Funny thing Happened on the Way to the Forum"?

One summer (1967) the theatre moved to what is now Crystal Cove. That season we did a theatrein-the-round. I remember that we staged "Oliver," "Bye, Bye Birdie" and "the Boyfriend." In other years, we also did shows such as "Stop the World, I Want to Get Off" (my cousin Thom Fordham and I were in that) and "Music Man" with Sandy Debus as Marion and Mike Boketti as Professor Harold Hill.



Some of the actors that appeared in over 11 years of shows included: talented dancer Jimmy Stevens; Jeff House, Martha Whelden, Jimmy McGuire and John Miadzielec, all of whom left us much too soon; Jeff (pretty boy) Bashford; Trina Mace, Andy Mace; Langdon Brown; Kathy Hill; George, Paul and Peter Plante; Mike Davis; Pierce and Mary Eileen O'Donnell; Mary, Dee Dee and Kathryn Pierce; Mike Bocketti; Dick Fredericks; Bob Campano; Candy Benson; twins Carol and Diane Droste...and some I've forgotten to list.

I hope I've been able to give you a small sampling of the gifts of art, music and culture that Jack Smead gave us. He introduced us to a wide range of music and composers. I've never met anyone from any other school who had one tenth of the opportunity that we, the privileged teens of the Golden Years at APHS and summer theatre, experienced. — Dee Pierce (Erickson)

Averill Park was lucky to have such a marvelous music teacher as Jack Smead. When Mr. Knipes, the head of the music department at the time, finished interviewing me for a music position, he sent me to the high school to meet with Jack. In less than ten minutes, we knew that we would get along and work together beautifully.

Although I was teaching 5th and 6th graders, Jack asked if I would play piano for many of his musicals and I was honored. Sometimes we'd do two pianos. Sometimes, his friend from Kingston would come and play the organ along with the piano. That was Howard Hotaling, another great musician. I can remember all of this as if it was vesterday!

Over the years, I have gone to many community theaters, area high schools and to Broadway to see musicals but never was there even one production as good as Jack Smead's. Never! Showboat, My Fair Lady, Camelot, the Fantasticks and many, many more were done with perfection. Jack could take a student and mold him/her into the character without a flaw. And singing? Oh, my! Jack would train these high school students so they sounded like professionals! Add with the help of dedicated



parents like Kitty Mace, Bea Danks and Ma Pilar Gemeinhardt who sewed costumes that looked so authentic to the period of the show, you have SRO every time.

I was so proud to know and to work with my dear friend, Jack Smead. He will never be replaced. - Marietta Mitchell

So many memories! The first of them dates back to about 1961 or so, when "The King and I" was first stated at Averill Park. My sister Trina played one of the younger children of the King. (When the show was reprised several years later, again with the original leads, Trina got to play an older child!)

For me, it was mostly bit parts, chorus...and a lot of behind-the-scenes work. I remember being a "page" in Camelot, one of many townspeople (and "sword dancers") in Brigadoon, and one of the many children in River City's band conducted by Professor Harold Hill in "Music Man"!

I recall 1970, the year I graduated from APHS, being the last year of Lyric/Crystal Theatre. That year, in addition to all those *incredibly important roles* as a member of the chorus, I spent a fair amount of time on the high school stage helping build and paint scenery, along with other behind-the-scenes work — at least until I ended up getting a full-time job (good for the wallet and my upcoming first semester of college, but not nearly as much fun).





Memories! Jack and/or Marietta on piano, often with Dick Knipes (band teacher) on a drum kit or tympani or whatever, and Howard Hotaling absolutely making that Hammond organ sing. They never missed a beat or a cue while they either gently led or brilliantly followed with the accompaniment!

Oddly, one of my most vivid memories was the 1969 production of "Camelot"; closing night was Sunday, July 20. You might recall that date being the date that the Apollo 11 lunar module landed on the moon! My family brought a small black-and-white TV up to the high school. Camelot is a fairly long show and, as much as we all enjoyed performing it, many of us got a bit anxious as the show progressed, fearing we might miss THE EVENT! But the show ended in plenty of time, and I still remember dozens of us crowding around the tiny screen to watch as Neil Armstrong set foot on the Moon! (Only two summers before, the big topic of conversation for many of us was Dr. Richard

Kimble finally catching up with the one-armed man on the dramatic finale of TV's "The Fugitive"!)

Looking back all these years later, I marvel at what Jack Smead was able to accomplish, especially during those summers of a show a week. Truly a wonderful experience! — *Andrew Mace*


